Dear LCDS Families,

At this time of year, you usually receive a large, heavy envelope with a letter from me updating you on summer's activities plus all of our back to school forms and information. The events of this year mean you have heard from me frequently over the summer; they have also prompted us to go virtual with this "mailing." Last school year ended during a time of unprecedented challenges and adaptations, a distinction that the beginning of the 2020-21 term will share. If I were considering only the outstanding efforts and achievements of our students, parents, and faculty last spring, I would have unwavering confidence in the success of the coming year. As it happens, my optimism rests on an even firmer foundation. Last spring was a period of observation, practical adjustments, and learning. This summer, we have devoted considerable resources to take what we've learned and make Lancaster Country Day a more safe, flexible, and nimble school.

Reopening Plan and Return to School COVID-19 Agreement

You have no doubt seen the [Health and Safety Reopening Plan](#) and understand the protocols in place are many. I believe in our plan and think it shows that we value nothing above the safety and quality of your child's education. These may be unprecedented times, but, as we look to the start of our 113th year, that commitment remains an assuring constant.

An important part of our shared responsibility in keeping the school safe is the [Return to School COVID-19 Agreement](#). We need all caregivers to review and sign this agreement - we would like you to acknowledge and understand that there is inherent risk in the enterprise of reopening school despite all our best efforts. This is not a waiver, but rather an acknowledgement of the present circumstances. Additionally, we will continue to address the overall safety needs of our students by continuing with our standard safety drills, done this year with COVID-19 protocols in mind. Opening Of School

On our first day, students will go through an early morning COVID-19 symptom screening at home through an app called GO Pass. On arrival at school, they will have their temperatures rechecked. Detailed instructions on the GO Pass system will follow later this week.
